Publicly Accessible Locations Guidance

The threat we face from terrorism is significant. As we have seen in the UK and across Europe attacks can happen at any time and any place without warning. Understanding the threat faced and the ways it can be mitigated can help keep everyone safer. Everyone can play a role in this effort by taking steps to help boost their protective security.

The Publicly Accessible Locations guidance, available on Protect UK, provides protective security advice in a number of sectors and scenarios. It covers the key forms of protective security: physical, personnel, cyber, and personal, and gives guidance on how different sectors can act to help make their businesses, institutions, or organisations safer.

This guidance is primarily aimed at those in the security sector and those who own or run businesses, organisations, amenities, or utilities. Prevent and the business sector



The private sector already plays an important role in delivering the Protect strand of the Government's CONTEST strategy, by contributing time, money, and expertise to improve the protective security of their infrastructures and the knowledge of staff with appropriate security training.

Prevent training is also available to the private sector from Counter Terrorism Policing. This training aims to educate people to spot the signs of radicalisation and protect people that are vulnerable to radicalisation.
